Of course, we are not the only ones conducting business virtually now. The state league's Council, which had been planned for late May in Grand Junction, will now be held virtually. And



the national league's Convention in late June in Washington, DC, has now been changed to a virtual convention. This was very disappointing, considering that this is the 100th Anniversary of the League and of women's suffrage.

Speaking of League Anniversaries ...

While we join Leaguers throughout the U.S. in celebrating the 100th anniversary of woman suffrage, we in Colorado can also be proud of our ancestors who achieved enlightenment considerably earlier than 1920. In 1876, Colorado's new state constitution granted women the right to vote in school elections. In the 1893 election Colorado became the first state to approve woman suffrage by popular election.

Wilma Davidson in her 1995 history of the LWV in Colorado (accessible from our web page "Our History" in the "Get To Know Us" menu) recounts the details. Carrie Chapman Catt and other leaders of the National American Women's Suffrage Association came to Colorado to help direct the campaign. Mrs. Elizabeth (Baby Doe) Tabor, wife of U.S. Senator H.A.W. Tabor, provided meeting and office space in Denver's Tabor Opera House. Suffrage clubs were formed in Longmont, Colorado Springs, Greeley, Georgetown, Breckenridge, and Denver. Other supporters included most of the newspapers, the Non-Partisan Equal Suffrage Association of Colorado, the Women's Christian Temperance Union, Colorado Governor Davis Waite and his Populist Party, and many Republican county conventions. The Colorado men voting in the November 7, 1893, statewide election approved the suffrage law by a vote of 35,798 to 29,451.



In 1993, we in LWVCO celebrated the 100th anniversary of woman suffrage in our state. In 2023 we will celebrate 130 years! Other milestones in the near future are 2021, the 90th birthday of the LWV of Boulder; 2024, 40 years since its expansion into the Boulder Valley; and 2025, 60th birthday of the LWV in Longmont. Much partying lies ahead!

Census News

The biggest news is that the Census Bureau has revised its schedule:

Original plan for responses: March 12 - July 31. Now extended to October 31.

Due to this change, they have requested Congressional approval to change the statutory deadlines related to congressional representation as follows:

- Apportionment counts (each state's population total, which determines its number of seats in the U.S. Representatives)—due by December 31, requested delay until April 30.
- Local counts delivered to each state (needed by the states to complete redistricting)—due by April 1, 2021—requested delay until July 31, 2021.

There seems to be bipartisan support for the statutory date changes, although further details will probably need to be worked out. Example: does this mean more funding, since many of the Census employees were originally hired through July and will now continue through October?

And, of course, this has implications for the states, including Colorado, on their redistricting schedules.

"Yes on National Popular Vote" Kicks off its Official Campaign

On April 14, the coalition supporting the National Popular Vote officially launched its campaign with a virtual press conference. The issue will appear on Colorado's state-wide ballot in November of this year. Many organizations have endorsed this effort, including Common Cause, CIRC, NAACP,

New Era Colorado. The League of Women Voters of Colorado and many local leagues, including League of Women Voters of Boulder County, are strong supporters.

On April 23, LWVBC and Yes on National Popular Vote hosted a <u>webinar</u>. The documentary film "Winner Take All" was featured, followed by remarks from Senator Mike Foote and then Q&A. The link to this webinar can be found on our website under Teams at Work/NPV Campaign.

Coloradans for NPV, the grassroots group headed up by Linda Sorauf and Sylvia Bernstein, recently started a **postcard-writing campaign**. To start, they are involving local leagues around the state, and they hope to receive thousands of completed postcards by July 1, to be mailed to voters closer to the election. In Boulder County,

we have a supply of packets strategically located: Holly Monkman in Boulder, Ruth Stemler in Longmont, and Peggy Leech in Louisville. If you are interested in participating in this effort, please contact one of the three, and we will arrange pickup/delivery. (In a socially-distanced way, of course!) **Please volunteer!**

The ballot on the left is a plurality (aka "choose-one" or first-past-the-post) ballot.

Did you answer "RCV" or "Ranked Choice Voting"? If you did, then you might be correct, but you might not. We don't have enough information to determine the ballot's voting method. We only know that the voter ranks her choices so we can call it a ranked-voting ballot or Ranking ballot as SurveyMonkey names it. (The SurveyMonkey website provides a variety of free online voting platforms.)

Let's review the essential elements of a voting method in the table below.

Recently an organization wanted to elect 9 people in a multi-winner contest. They could have picked boring ole plurality-block voting where you vote for up to 9 candidates and the top 9 vote-getters win, but - good for them - they wanted to give the voters more expressiveness. They said, "Let's use ranked choice voting." Great!

EXCEPT that the organization used SurveyMonkey's Ranking method which operates as described in the Example section of the Voting Method table above. SurveyMonkey uses Borda Count, not multi-winner RCV!

RCV can refer to several variations of voting methods, but they all involve <u>transferring votes</u>. You've probably heard, "If your first choice is eliminated, then your vote is transferred to your second choice."

Plurality and Borda Count are <u>summation</u> methods. Each ballot contributes independently to the candidates' totals. On election night, officials can report candidates' running totals as the vote tabulation progresses. In contrast, RCV's vote-transfer feature depends on how candidates are faring on all the ballots so preliminary results may be delayed until all or almost all the ballots are processed.

Colorado statute only permits the two traditional RCV methods: single-winner instant-runoff voting (IRV) and multi-winner single transferable vote (STV). In both methods, the ballot looks identical. (See the August 2018 LWVBC *Voter* article "RCV: Two Better Ways to Vote.")

"Ranked voting" is the general term used by the Colorado Secretary of State and our Voting Methods Team when referring to a voter ranking choices on a ballot. Ranked voting includes - but isn't limited to - Borda Count, different vote-transfer forms of RCV, and Bucklin Voting (aka the Grand Junction System used in Pueblo, Denver, CO Springs, Fort Collins and more than 60 cities in the US in the 20th century).

The next time you want to conduct an informal poll or carry out a voting experiment, consider trying one of the free user-friendly online voting platforms in the table below. Remember that tabulation is an integral part of the voting method! If the online ballot doesn't clearly state how the votes will be tallied, the poll creator should clarify that before any votes are cast.

Please note that any online voting system is highly vulnerable to many forms of attack.

No public elections should offer online voting, as explained by the National Academies in

The proposed budget was agreed to. Please see <u>the April Voter</u> for details. Contributions form a bigger part of the budget than dues after LWVBC pays its share of state and national dues. Grants are another important contributor.

Anne Bryan discussed fund development, emphasizing monthly donations, bequests, and grocery cards. She presented the table at right as an example of how monthly donations add up.
